## ELECTEE REQUIREMENTS: Winter 2007

The following is a list of the requirements involved in the TBP electee process, ordered chronologically. Please note the dates of the meetings and requirements in your calendar.

Attend all meetings (all are on Tuesday nights)

- iii. Make up the meeting with one extra hour of service.

- \_\_\_\_\_ 1. **Attend First Comity (January 24<sup>th</sup>, 7:00 pm in the Johnson Rooms, Lurie)**
- \_\_\_\_\_ 2. **Attend Second Comity (January 30<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 pm in 1013 Dow)**  
Due: 2 copies of resume, 2 copies of essay, Student Profile Form  
Due before **February 12<sup>th</sup>**: 5 hours of service, 1 social event, and 1 group activity
- \_\_\_\_\_ 3. **Attend one 50-minute interview with two actives (February 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup>. Scheduled by Hayes Smith, hcsmith).**  
We look at your resume, character essay, and Student Profile Form during the interviews, so make sure you hand these things in **by Second Comity**.
- \_\_\_\_\_ 4. **Do at least FIVE hours of service projects before February 12<sup>th</sup>.**  
Alternately, you may do 3 service hours and also fulfill the minimum tutoring requirement (2 hours). Keep track of your service hours. It is your responsibility to sign up for projects on the website and to do the service you are interested in. In your electee packet are the dates and descriptions of service activities.
- \_\_\_\_\_ 5. **Do at least ONE TBP social event before February 12<sup>th</sup>.**  
Socials include Rock 'n Bowls, Engineering Futures, TGs, sports, and many more.
- \_\_\_\_\_ 6. **Do at least ONE Group Activity before February 12<sup>th</sup>.**  
Each electee is assigned to a group consisting of officers, group leaders, and other actives. To fulfill this requirement you must get together with all the members of your group for any activity you all choose—just get to know each other!
- \_\_\_\_\_ 7. **Attend Electee/Actives I (February 20<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 pm in 1670 CSE)**  
Due: Electee exam, 2 old exams, \$90
- \_\_\_\_\_ 8. **Complete and hand in the electee exam, along with 2 old exams, by E/A I.**  
Hand in the electee exam, which tests your knowledge of the history of TBP as well as our chapter. We encourage you to work together on it! Feel free to drop by office hours to ask officers for answers (up to three). Please don't ask for answers via e-mail—we want to get to know you! Submit two old exams electronically for our exam file (yes, you'll have to scan them). You must make *sure* this is okay with the instructor; they have a tendency to overreact about such things.
- \_\_\_\_\_ 9. **Give \$90 to Loc Thang (wildthan), check payable to Tau Beta Pi, by E/A I.**  
No, we are not hoarding the money. This pays for electee supplies, the banquet, your bent, fancy certificates, your lifetime membership, and things like this.

- \_\_\_\_\_ **10. One or more hours of Bucket Drive on March 6<sup>th</sup>/7<sup>th</sup> (contact bzshang for details).**  
One hour is required. If you choose to do more, your second hour then counts for TWO hours of service! Each additional hour thereafter counts for one hour of service. (Date subject to change.)
- \_\_\_\_\_ **11. Attend E/A II (March 6<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 pm in 1013 Dow)**  
Due: Electee interviews of fellow Tau Bates
- \_\_\_\_\_ **12. Interviews of 6 fellow Tau Bates, by E/A II.**  
The interviews are to get to know your fellow members in Tau Beta Pi a little better. At least two of the people interviewed must be active members. Think of 6 creative questions to ask people- nothing like the mundane, "What's your favorite color?" The questions must be typed, but answers may be written. To encourage personal interaction, interviews should be done in person, none of these silly "e-mail interviews."
- \_\_\_\_\_ **13. Attend Elections (March 20<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 pm in 1013 Dow)**  
We elect the officers for the next term during this meeting, so make sure you show up and exercise your democratic rights. Electees are encouraged to run for positions, so start thinking about what you might like to run for!
- \_\_\_\_\_ **14. Attend Electee/Actives III (March 27<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 pm in 1013 Dow)**  
All service hours completed      Tutoring (1 session)      Bucket drive (1 hour)  
All social events attended      Group projects completed
- \_\_\_\_\_ **15. Have completed 15 total hours of service projects, by E/A III.**  
These include the 5 hours due by February 12<sup>th</sup> but **DO NOT** include the minimum hours for tutoring or bucket drive. You may do a maximum of 5 independent hours of service (hours not associated with Tau Beta Pi) provided you show adequate proof of your involvement, and that the hours do not count for another society. Finally, you cannot get all hours from a single event; a minimum of two events is required.
- \_\_\_\_\_ **16. Attend a total of TWO or more TBP social events by E/A III**  
This includes the one social due by February 12<sup>th</sup>.
- \_\_\_\_\_ **17. One two-hour session of university tutoring by E/A III.**  
One two-hour session is required by E/A III (March 27<sup>th</sup>) but the last tutoring day could be as much as a week before this! Tutoring beyond two hours will count towards other service hours (you receive two hours for each additional tutoring session). Be sure to complete a Tutoring Demand Form (found on the TBP website) for each tutoring session in a timely manner or else you will not receive credit. Talk to Charles Wineland (cdwiii) for any questions or refer to the website for detailed descriptions of all tutoring related projects.
- \_\_\_\_\_ **18. One group activity with *all* the members of your electee group by E/A III.**  
Due to popular demand, the activity this term will once again be a dessert-making contest. You and your group make a TBP-themed dessert and bring it to E/A III.
- \_\_\_\_\_ **19. Attend Initiation and Banquet, March 31<sup>st</sup> at 4 pm in 1109 FXB and at Campus Inn.**  
This is an absolute must and cannot be made up with an hour of service. Don't miss it!

Remember, this is only what you *have* to do – there are no limits on what you can do.

## Character Evaluation (Winter 2007)

*Exemplary character* is one of the requisites for membership in Tau Beta Pi. In addition to being active members of the engineering community, Tau Beta Pi members all possess the highest integrity of moral character. Our chapter will assess your character through a written essay and an interview.

### Essay

The first part of character assessment in Tau Beta Pi is the written essay. You will be required to write a brief (1 – 2 page) essay about what exemplary character means to you. The essay is a rather open ended assignment, and we encourage you to get creative with your description. Nevertheless, exemplary character is not an arbitrary concept, and we are looking for specific evidence that you know what this important quality means. The quotes on the back of this page may help inspire you on the subject of exemplary character, but don't limit yourself to those ideas.

Please note that the essay is due at Second Comity on **January 30<sup>th</sup>**.

### Interview

The interview is the most important part of character assessment. Electees can be denied membership on the basis of a very negative interview, so take the process seriously. Demonstrate that you possess high levels of integrity and drive, and you will be well on your way to membership in Tau Beta Pi.

Interviews will be held February 5, 6, 7, and 8 in the Duderstadt Center Conference rooms. Your interview will last approximately 50 minutes. Dress is business casual – please do not wear a suit, but also avoid jeans. Interviewers will review the résumé and essay you submit at Second Comity; if something prevents you from attending, please bring a 2 copies of each to the interview. You will be able to sign up for a spot after First Comity.

## Winter 2007 Project Descriptions

**5K Fun Run (kdsouza):** Sponsored by ASME and SWE, Tau Bates help out with the 5K Fun Run to help raise money for Child and Family Life at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital! Volunteers help with course setup, registration, morale to runners, and cleanup.

**Adopt-A-Highway (rrindler):** MDOT created Adopt-A-Highway in 1990 to improve the beauty of our highway roadsides with community help. With the help of 6-12 TBPers, we clean a 2 mile stretch of US 23 near North Campus.

**Arb Restoration (semant, mastriac):** If you like the outdoors, this project is for you! We help to keep the Arb the beautiful place it is by helping clear out dead trees, picking up litter, and assorted groundskeeping tasks. A group of about 10 of will go to the Nichols Arboretum (<http://www.umich.edu/~wwwarb/>) to work on an arb restoration project which is to be determined. Previous projects have included maintenance and re-routing of the stream that runs through it, planting, and various other types of light outdoor work.

**Big Brothers/Big Sisters (jsamorez):** Volunteer to help out with a fun activity with the Big Brothers/ Big Sisters organization. Previous projects include helping out with an overnight lock-in! Volunteers were needed to help with crafts, games in their gym, general supervising, and clean-up.

**Botanical Gardens (derk):** The University of Michigan has its very own Matthaei Botanical Gardens that houses exotic plants from around the world with the help of volunteers. Volunteer opportunities range from planting/maintaining the gardens to administrative work.

**Bottle Drive (aesall):** We will be going around to area residences and collecting used pop bottles. Drop boxes can be left at frequently traveled sites for a week. The money from the deposits will be given to a local charity.

**Bucket Drive (bzshang, rrhein, egu):** Collect money throughout central and north campus for 2 days for a local charity. One hour is required for initiates, but extra hours are encouraged and actives are needed as well!

**Cancer Center (perrinc, xiaojane):** This is a volunteer open house at the University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center. Volunteers will be need to assist with check-in, children's activities, refreshments, clean-up, etc. One possible project is the Valentine's Day project for the hospital. Volunteer will be needed to help assemble valentine's day baggies for the adult cancer patients.

**Spring To Life (jrshust, pgrund, dheis):** This is an annual fundraising event put on by the Cancer Center to raise money for its research and yearly programs. The event features a brunch by several local chefs, and beautiful plants and arrangements of flowers are featured and available for purchase. The event also displays art created by patients, all with a focus on the journey of cancer.

**Cub Scouts Day (drcarp):** Cub Scouts day is an event planned to aid local cub scouts troops in receiving an engineering badge. Volunteers will be needed to help set up stations in which troops can participate in various engineering projects.

**Easter Baskets:** We made easter baskets for the America Reads program. There were an assortment of baskets decorated with easter grass, chocolate candies, cadbury eggs, a stuffed animal, and handmade cards.

**Food Gatherers (grafw):** Food Gatherers help prepare a warm meal, serve it, and clean up afterwards at the Delonis Center in Ann Arbor, which temporarily houses approximately 90 homeless people and serves regular meals to the community that have trouble making ends meet. This project directly benefits certain members of the Ann Arbor community that need food.

**Gilbert Residence:** BINGO! Remember this great old school favorite? Join us to visit the young at heart at the Gilbert Resident, a provider of nursing home and assisted living services for senior citizens.

**Glacier Hills Nursing Home (brettmu):** Spend time with nursing home residents that may not normally get a chance to visit with young people. Usually we play musical bingo with the residents, and it's a lot of fun!

**Habitat for Humanity (mdebbas):** A great hands-on activity where we help build a house for a poverty stricken family. NO experience is necessary. Experienced builders will help you and tell you exactly what to do. Actives are strongly encouraged to participate as well!

**Hands-On Musuem (wrangler, shahiali):** Have fun with kids at the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum helping them perform experiments. Hands-on activites for the kids include making their own microbes, exploring unique musical instruments, and celebrating DNA day!

**Kid's Fair (gauthied):** Kids Fair is a day where over 1000 1st - 5th grade students come to participate in activities organized by different student groups. The event is held at Crisler Arena and has a specific theme every year, with this year's theme being "The Human Body: A Head to Toe Adventure." At the TBP booth, we made silly putty and had the kids play with oobleck and slime.

**Knitwits (lluong):** Knitwits is a fun service project where you have the opportunity to help the less fortunate. We sew together scraps of fleece to make warm mittens, hats, and scarves for the homeless here in Ann Arbor. No experience is necessary; instructions and materials all provided!

**Monte Carlo Night (anlesko, aacovert):** Monte Carlo Night is an event to support the dancers of Dance Marathon. We provide a place for the dancers to take a break and have some fun playing Blackjack, Craps and Roulette.

**Neutral Zone:** Neutral Zone is a safehaven for high-school-age young people in Ann Arbor. Teens are always welcome to just hang out, but they also offer ongoing programs such as Volume Youth Poetry, Break Dancin' Basics, Youth Owned Records, Rebel Grrls Music Project, The Mentor Program, and Drop-in Tutoring. Previous projects include preparing a full dinner for the teens and helping with a mailout for a musical event.

**North Campus Service Day (mitalim):** North Campus Service Day is a cross campus initiative designed to promote community service and social action amongst the members of the CoE and other schools on North Campus. TBP works with UMEC to set up volunteer locations in Ann Arbor/Ypsilanti for the day. Other tasks may include organizing the introductory session, designing a t-shirt, and/or planning breakfast and lunch for the participants.

**Pound House (ebachyns):** Pound House is a child care center which watches over 45 children each week. Volunteers are needed to provide to do various projects to the Pound House. A great opportunity to do

something worthwhile for the children in the Ann Arbor community.

**Project SEED (kelbaker):** We will be helping out elementary students in a Detroit elementary school to do various activities. One previous project was to make slime with 3rd grade students in an after-school enrichment program at Harm's Elementary School.

**Recycle Ann Arbor (tjwii):** Aid in the efforts to increase the amount of recycling in the Ann Arbor area. Recycle AA is a reuse center that takes donations of reusable material such as furniture, housewares, and lumber then resells to the public or donates to other non-profit organizations. Volunteers are needed to maintain the center; tasks include sorting materials, making displays, cleaning etc. There may be a possibility that some outdoor work will be done.

**Ronald McDonald House (huizenb, ctsshah):** The Ronald McDonald House is a place for parents who have children receiving medical treatment at the UM Hospital to live and take care of their children during a difficult time. We will be cooking dinner for the families.

**SAFE House:** SAFE House is a place that supports survivors of domestic violence and their children. Previous projects include making dinner for them and helping organize and clean the children's play area.

**Science Fair Judging (allensg):** Scarlett Middle School and Mitchell Elementary School need engineers and scientists to help judge science fair projects! No interviews will take place, purely poster presentations. Judges will be paired and asked to provide positive feedback and give place ribbons. Every student will get a ribbon, and the top projects will get trophies and a ribbon. Judges will not determine grades, but do determine awards given, and hopefully will spur students to choose more science and math curricula as they grow older.

**Science Fun:** Go to an Angell Elementary school in the afternoons to help set up science experiments and demos for elementary students.

**Sequoia Place Computer Help:** Fancy the internet? Find yourself procrastinating on the computer? Well come visit the residents of Sequoia Place, an elderly independent-living residence, who are looking for someone to help them learn basic computer and Internet skills. Now you can have fun on the computer AND volunteer at the same time!

**Soup Kitchen (eisenbem, tvez, cdwiii):** Help out at a local soup kitchen by preparing and serving food.

**Washtenaw Literacy (halinar):** Volunteer at Washtenaw Literacy. Opportunities can range from tutoring in their library to helping out with a building project. Their annual World-In-A-Basket fundraiser occurs in the Fall, and volunteers are needed to setup in the morning and help run the event at night. Conversation groups also provide an opportunity for ESL members living in Ann Arbor to develop their English skills.
